Q. 100. How is Baptism rightly administer'd?

A. Baptism is rightly administer'd by Immersion, or Dipping the whole Body of the Party in Water, [n] in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, according to Christ's Institution, and the Practice of the Apostles, [o] and not by sprinkling or pouring of Water, or dipping tome Part of the Body, after the Tradition of Men. [p]

The Lord's Supper is an Ordinance of the New Testament, instituted by Jesus Christ: wherein by giving and receiving Bread and Wine, according to his Appointment, his Death is shewed forth, (t) and the worthy Receivers are not after a corporeal and carnal manner, but by Faith, made Partakers of his Bedy and. Blood, with all his Benefits, to their spiritual Nourish-

ment, and growth in Grace. (a)

t 1 Cor. 11. 23, 24, 25, 26. I received of the Lord, shat which also I delivered unto you, that the Lord o Jesus, the same Night in which he was betrayed, took Bread, and when he had given Thanks he brake it, and faid, Take, eat, this is thy Body which is broken for you; this do in Remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the Cup, when he had supped, 1aying, This Cup is the New Testament in my Blood, this do ye as oft as ye drink it, in Remembrance of me : For as oft as ye Ear this Bread, and Drink this Cup, ye do shew forth the Lord's Death till he come.

Q. 104. What is required to the worthy receiving of

the Lord's Supper?

A: It is required of them that would worthily partake of the Lord's Supper, that they examine them-

felves.
